## Secretary's Message

Dear Members of ICCWTN, friends and stakeholders at all levels,

It is my privilege to place before you the report for the year 2021-22.

These are like the war years. We are now in the third year of the pandemic. Life as we knew it seems to have changed. What we are trying to gauge is where the new normal lies and how we may adapt to it. The children in our sphere of influence have happily adapted to whatever circumstance they are placed in and go cheerfully about their activities. We are all trying to keep up and grow with them.

Schools opened up in phases and all children have returned to school. We have resumed the basic tuitions to help children with their board exams in the Resource Center for girl children.

The CHILDLINE 1098 service has worked without pause through the different phases of lockdowns. Likewise, the residential rehabilitation centers for children have housed children through the different periods of lockdowns. The sponsorship team has worked to provide support to the children whose education we support.

We are fortunate to have dedicated and motivated staff and resource persons who work continually to help the neediest children.

Some of our other activities are yet to resume. These include the Rainbow crèches and the MLTC programmes. We have also been unable to hold any gatherings and group activities for children of the community. We await conditions conducive for resuming the services.

The COVID 19 pandemic has cast a long shadow on all aspects of life. Under the mandate of the Directorate of Social Defence, Government of Tamil Nadu, we undertook a rapid review of the Impact of Covid 19 pandemic on the lives of Children. This review was focussed on the effect on child protection, nutrition, health and education of children in the state of Tamil Nadu. The report is being submitted to the Directorate of Social Defence

ICCWTN has worked on and studied child marriages through the lens of child rights and child protection in the past few years. As a natural follow up, the effect of COVID on the implementation of the PCMA and the gaps therein was studied. The report is being submitted to the Directorate of Social Welfare.

The Children's Library in our campus was set up in partnership with The Rotary Club of Anna Nagar – Madras to benefit the children of the community. Though the library was inaugurated in February 2021, there has been a restriction on the number of children we could invite because of the pandemic restrictions. Now with things opening up, we are increasing the publicity for the facility.

The Miyawaki forest set up in our premises continues to thrive with the active participation and care of the children resident in the campus. It is a welcome island of green in the concrete jungle.

We are fortunate to enjoy the support and understanding of the State Government, the understanding project partners, our sponsors, well-wishers and patrons. We are able to persevere in our work emboldened by this support.

### BACKGROUND:

The Council provides residential care facility for boys in need of Care and Protection. Homes have been established, in Chennai, Kilambakkam (Thiruvallur Dist.) and Thanjavur.

### OBJECTIVES:

- To provide a family like atmosphere and age appropriate care to the Children in need of Care and Protection (CNCP).
- To integrate Normal and Challenged Children and instill in them values of caring and sharing.
- To provide opportunities for the overall development and building self-reliance in children.

### SERVICES PROVIDED:

- A Residential Centre for Children in need of Care and Protection.
- Provide opportunity for Education
- Provide children with opportunities for their holistic development through co curricular activities such as art competitions, theatre, etc.
- The Thanjavur District Council is running a Boys’ Home with a total strength of 45 Destitute Boys. The District Collector is the President of the District Council. The activities are being monitored by a Special Committee with Mr. Raghuram as the Secretary.

All the three Homes received Non recurring Grant which is given once in five years. The Homes bought the sanctioned appliances. The homes at Thiruvallur and Thanjavur also received grant for construction.

All the staff and children between 12 – 18 years were vaccinated.

The Monthly Report, ICPS MIS Form and financial statements of all the Homes are regularly being submitted to the concerned DCPO's office. The Individual Care Plan for each child is maintained in the Homes.

**Special Events**

- The Volunteers of (MAD) Make a Difference are regularly taking online classes for children.
- Independence Day, Gandhi Jayanthi, Teacher's Day, Republic Day, Children's Day and all important festivals were celebrated.
- Birthdays of all the children are celebrated in the Home.
- The District level Youth Arts Festival are organized by Nehru Yuva kendra and Arul Mozhi Arts Youth Forum. Students of our home participated and won the second prize at the district level.
- Thanjavur Tamil University observed the National Science Day on 27.02.2022 for the academic year 2021-2022 with the science exhibition competition held on at on the occasion. On behalf of Thanjavur District Child Welfare Committee, our home students participated of and won the third prizes
- Dental camp was held on 19.02.2022 the home students and staff attended the camp.



**Vadamalli**

This purple coloured round shaped flower is commonly known as the Global Amaranth . Vadamalli is well known to retain its shape and colour well after drying. It was this spirit of the flower, that Inner Wheel Club of Baycity leveraged when they launched the VADAMALLI initiative to support and mentor the creative skills of the children during the pandemic.

With the onset of COVID in March 2020, the Inner Wheel Club of Bay City received a number of calls from Orphanages and Children Homes to help with creative activity to keep the children engaged. These children, who stayed in the Homes, were unable to go back to their parents/ guardians for various reasons though the Government had notified that all orphanages/ creches and children's homes be closed.



The Inner Wheel Club of BAYCITY soon swung into action. Under the strong leadership of Bala and Udhaya, they soon set up Zoomba classes and storytelling events in June 2020. This captured the imagination of the children and soon the creative skills of the children was leveraged. Due to COVID restriction, the programs are conducted on line. Children access the program through the TV in their respective locations.

The programs are conducted twice a month and more than 50 such programs have been conducted and are being attended by the children of both Homes.

### **BACKGROUND:**

CHILDLINE is India’s 24-hour- toll free, phone outreach service for children in need of care and protection. Childline India Foundation (CIF) set up by Government of India is responsible for the running of Childline Centres across the various states of India It currently functions in 366 cities across 34 states / UTs in India, with the aim of providing CHILDREN in need with relief and rehabilitation in the space of shelter, medical aid, repatriation, rescue, emotional support and guidance. CHILDLINE collaborates with Police, Government Departments and other functionaries operating under Juvenile Justice Act 2015.

### **CHENNAI CHILDLINE:**

Chennai CHILDLINE was started on 30th April 1999 as a Government and NGO Network. The Council is one among the five Collaborative Organizations maintaining a ‘round the clock’ call receiving centre in the city. We respond to calls on 1098, provide emergency intervention, link children with services and document every call.

### **CUDDALORE CHILDLINE:**

CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) initiated this service after the Tsunami in the year 2005. It is managed by the District Council of Cuddalore.

#### Mass awareness on Childline

A Mass Awareness on Child Helpline on the 23rd March 2022 in CMBT (Chennai Mofussil Bus Termination). Mr. Rajkumar, Chairperson, CWC South, Ms. Tamil Selvi, Chairperson CWC Central, Juvenile Aid Police Unit Inspector, Mr. Alagapan, Director, Childline, ICCWTN were the Chief Guests. The intern students and the ICCW- Childline team members conducted the Awareness Programme. A street play was performed by the student interns. Many members of the public were given awareness.



#### Training on Capacity Building for Staff

A capacity building programme on various acts/guidelines/circulars and Standard Operating Process for dealing with children which aimed at having a wider and in depth knowledge on the same for the team members working in the CHILDLINE 1098, handling unique cases on a day-to-day basis on the 23rd and 24th of March 2022. The workshop helped in depth understanding and work efficiently for implementing acts to the children that we serve, ways to approach the stakeholders- Approach towards responding to calls (Phone communication skills and efficacy of response), Counselling skills, Legal inputs, Crisis Intervention skills, first aid skills, Child Rights, Team building and empathy, Procedure to maintain progress records, Methods to collect information from the child, Type of protocols to follow to produce children in the Child Welfare Committee etc.

*Child P, a 16 year old, studying in the 11<sup>th</sup> Std, was sexually abused by her father who is an alcoholic. The child was constantly abused by the father when she was at home. The child did not inform her mother as she felt it would bring shame to the family. The child has irregular periods was taken to the hospital for a check-up. A scan of her uterus showed that she was eight months pregnant. After investigation the father was arrested under the POSCO Act and put in jail.*

### Training program at Cuddalore

A training programme was conducted on 18<sup>th</sup> November 2021 on Prevention of child marriages, protection of children from sexual abuses, creation of safe atmosphere, protection of the girl child and to join as friend of Childline. 28 people took part in the Programme

### Volunteer meeting

A meeting was conducted for the Members of the 3 Blocks in Cuddalore where 32 Volunteer participated. The Training was about Prevention of child marriages, protect the children from sexual abuses, creation of safe atmosphere, protect girl child and to join as friend of Childline.

*Child S was a 16 year old girl child from a village in Cuddalore. The child was to be married. This call came through a concerned adult. The District Social Welfare Officer intervened to stop the marriage but the family refused. So the child was rescued and produced before the CWC for temporary care. Then the parents were counselled and sensitized on the demerits of child marriage and they signed a mutual agreement. The parents approached for restoration but the child refused to go with her parents. She was willing to stay in a CCI and continue her education.*



### **Awareness on the usage of LPG Gas**

Varalakshmi Gas Agency, who is the distributors of Indane Gas conducted a one-hour safety clinic on the usage of LPG Gas cylinders, dos and don'ts and precautions to be taken while using the same. It was attended by all the staff of the Council.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Convention on the Rights of Child (CRC) lays emphasis on the need to provide alternate forms of child care to marginalized and vulnerable children in order to prevent institutionalization of children. Sponsorship is an important alternative to Institutionalisation and enables children to receive care even as they continue to live with their families.

This Programme aims to provide children from economically weaker sections with financial assistance and counselling services, in order to help them pursue formal education and vocational training. The Programme helps them to live with their own families and continue their education. Special preferences are given to physically challenged children and girl children.

### **Methodology and Monitoring**

- The Selection process is done through referrals from Schools, NGOs and well-wishers.
- A close contact is maintained with the sponsors and the children are encouraged to correspond with their sponsors through the Council. Periodic reports about the child are sent to the sponsors.
- The Social Worker act as a liaison between the sponsor and the child. She works with the whole family and monitors the child's progress.
- The Social Worker visits the child twice a year to ensure that the sponsorship money is judiciously spent.
- A case file is maintained for every sponsored child.
- Career guidance is offered to the children as they finish schooling.
- The sponsorship money received is deposited in child's bank account with the parent as the guardian.

### **AMRITHAVARSHINI SCHOLARSHIP**

This was an intervention undertaken by the Council immediately after the Tsunami. Sothikuppam was one of the villages badly affected. We found that children from this village in the final years of schooling could not continue their education. Therefore, this sponsorship was introduced by the Council to support such children for higher studies either Vocational Training or Colleges. The interesting fact is that the amount for this project was raised by the efforts of two teenage school girls who went around seeking donations immediately after the tsunami. The donation amount along with the interest, is being utilized every year. This year 5 Children received sponsorship.

### **ICCW New Delhi scholarship**

## **SANKALP – EDUCATION FOR GIRL CHILDREN**

### **1. Scholarship for College students**

Totally 36 children received assistance from Girl Children Project. Out of 36 children 09 school going and 27 colleges going children benefitted through this programme

### **2. Kanan Verma Scholarship - Scholarship for students of Social Work:**

For Kanan Verma Scholarship to identify deserving social work students, letters was sent to few Colleges in the city having MSW course. Received 7 deserving students details form Mar Gregorious College, Anna Adarsh College and MSSW.

### **3. Project to provide Sanitary Napkins to the inmates of the Government Girl's Home, Kellys run by the Department of Social Defence. :**

The children in this home are admitted by the Child Welfare Committee, Chennai under the Juvenile Justice Act. There are more than 300 girls in this Home and all of them come from the most marginalised sections of society. As part of our project, we have been providing sanitary napkins for all the adolescent girls in this home for the past five years.

- Issued 995 inner garments to the girls
- 3810 sanitary napkin pads issued

We acknowledge the kind support of Interface, Chennai.

### **Rajeshwari Nathan Foundation Scholarship**

We have identified 3 Girls' schools in the Chennai city for Rajeshwari Nathan Sponsorship programme to the Girl children. As of now, we have received a list of 139 girl students from the identified three schools. We have visited the student's home and verified their details to provided educational assistance. This year we have issued cheque for 30 deserving girl students.

1. Chennai Girls Higher Secondary School, Pulla Avenue, Shenoy Nagar
2. Government Adi Dravidar Welfare School, Vyasarpadi
3. Chennai Corporation Higher Secondary School, Subbarayan, Aminjikarai

### **Smartphone for the sponsorship beneficiaries**

Due to COVID-19 pandemic, educational institutes have shifted to online learning platforms to keep continue the academic activities. Apart from sessions, students have to download and upload the study materials. They were heavily dependent on mobile phones to continue their studies. The lock down greatly affected the lower socio-economic and many of them have lost their jobs. Our sponsorship children have only basic phones and they could not afford a computers or smartphones. To support the students to continue their education in online we have provided smartphone to the deserving students. In this programme, 8 students were issued smartphones.



### **Women's Day Celebration**

We celebrated the International Women's Day on the 8<sup>th</sup> of March 2022. Mrs. Chinna Vellai Thai, the Head mistress of the Chennai School, Shenoy Nagar, was the chief guest at the function. The Chief Guest Mrs. Chinna Vellai Thai spoke about the role of mentors and about her personal educational journey, women empowerment, importance of education and role of social workers in society. As part of the celebrations, the Kanan Verma scholarships were awarded to 7 girl students pursuing their Master of Social Work in various colleges in Chennai for the years 2021 and 2022.



## MOTHER AND CHILD WELFARE PROJECT AT USILAMPATTI

YEAR OF STARTING - 1987

### **BACKGROUND**

Indian Council for Child Welfare, Tamil Nadu initiated its fight against the practice of Female Infanticide in the year 1988 with a small grant from National Children's Fund. Starting with the 10 hamlets of the Usilampatti, the Project was slowly expanded to cover 309 villages of Usilampatti Taluk. In the first few years, the focus was prevention of female infanticide through various means to save girl children. We are happy to report that after 2001, there has not been a single case of female infanticide reported in the 309 villages. The Project evolved to include a creation of a Federation of women Self help groups, Sponsorship support for Girl children and opening of a Community College to enhance skill training among young adolescents in 2010.

### **PROGRAMMES**

#### **School Health Programme:**

Adolescent girls in the schools was sensitized on issues related to puberty, menstruation, genital and menstrual hygiene, nutrition and child marriage. Sensitized on child harassment, mental stress, suicidal thoughts, counselling, Child Help line and other institutions helping children. Awareness created through Health Educational classes, Group discussion, PPT presentation and skit by nursing students. Health awareness program to help the adolescent girls to practise personal hygiene and environmental sanitation and promote healthy living. 125 adolescent girls from 3 Government Higher Secondary Schools were covered under this program.



#### **Deworming Day:**

Deworming Day was celebrated on 15<sup>th</sup> March 2022 in our campus. Deworming improves immunity, and thereby protecting us from chronic illnesses caused by worms. It improves concentration and attendance, making them more productive in college. It increases nutritional uptake and controls infections such as anemia, loose bowels, etc. Awareness created to the students by our faculty member. PHC staff participated in the program and distributed free deworming tables to the students.

#### **Study on Covid-19:**

ICCWTN conducted a review on the impact of Covid 19 pandemic on the lives of children in Madurai District in both Urban and Rural areas in the month of October 2021. Six of the staff participated in the study. They collected information from 300 rural families in nine villages in Usilampatti Taluk. One day orientation was given to the participants by the Officer in charge of the Project. During the visit of the Honorary General Secretary, she explained about the Project.



The Honorary General Secretary Mrs. Padma Yerra visited Usilampatti Project on 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2021 along with Honorary Joint Secretary- South Mrs. Valli Annamali. A Staff meeting was conducted and all ongoing programs of Usilampatti project were discussed in the meeting.

## VELLORE DISTRICT COUNCIL

**YEAR OF COMMENCEMENT :1985**

### Introduction

The task of removing children from beedi rolling work in Vellore was initiated in the year 1988. Although employment of children in Beedi rolling was considered hazardous and banned by the Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986, the practice of employing children for rolling beedis continued in the Community.

The main thrust of our Project was to abolish this system in 16 selected villages. **As a result of our work, 108 bonded children were released from Beedi rolling and 2457 working children were mainstreamed into regular schools.** This was made possible by our intense campaigning, the availability of support services and strengthening of Government monitoring.

After 2005, our work continued in the direction of forming women into self-help groups to sustain our achievements of Child Labour free villages through Village Education Development Committees formed by the Council.

At present, the District Council Runs

1. Day Care Centres for Pre School Children in the low income areas with local and District Funds. This year the creche programme remained closed due to COVID19
2. Skill Development Centre for young adolescent children - Tailoring.

WHO is striving towards achieving this goal by creating awareness about the fact that health is a human right and everyone should have access to the right care at the right time and at the right place within their community. All the students were participated in the program.

### Validation Program:

The Validation program was held on 10<sup>th</sup> August 2021. All the 31 students appeared for the final year exam were successfully completed the course. Diploma certificates were issued to all the completed students. Best academic students and Best Clinical students were honored with awards.

### Lamp lighting Ceremony:

## ADOPTION SCRUTINY

**YEAR OF COMMENCEMENT :** 1985  
**SCRUTINY REPORTS GIVEN in 2021-2022 : 8**

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Indian Council for Child Welfare is one of the National bodies recognized by the Supreme Court of India along with their affiliated organizations to assist the Courts to come to the conclusion with reference to the merits of individual child adoption cases filed in the courts in India.

- ICCW-TN has been appointed by the High Court of Madras as Adoption Scrutinizing Agency since the year 1985.
- We regularly receive Court Orders to scrutinize and file reports on matters pertaining to In Country or Inter-Country Adoptions filed in the High Court and District Courts of Tamil Nadu.

We conduct thorough appraisals and submit our reports to the concerned Courts with reference to the following facts.

- Whether the child is legally free for adoption.
- Whether the petitioners are competent persons to adopt a child.
- Whether all ethics, norms and guidelines as stipulated down by the Supreme Court of India, the Central and the State Governments have been followed in a particular case.

### **THE PROCESS**

All the relevant documents are carefully verified as precursors for reporting to the concerned Court as to whether all the procedures of the Supreme Court and Government of India have been adhered to, details of the child and whether the adoption placement is in the best interest of the child.

- Records are maintained for all placements of children whose cases have been scrutinized.
- Interaction with State Government and other appropriate authorities to ensure safe procedures to protect the rights of all concerned – the child, the birth parents and adoptive parents is a vital part of the work.

## **ASIAN ONLINE RESOURCE CENTRE FOR PREVENTION OF CHILD ABUSE & NEGLECT**

**DATE OF COMMENCEMENT:** September 2014

ISPCAN is a multi-disciplinary international organization that brings together a worldwide cross-section of committed professionals to work towards the prevention of child abuse and child maltreatment in every nation. With the collaboration, with ISPCAN, the Council set up Asian Online Resource Centre. We created an online resource portal called, 'Asian Online Resource Center.'

This website aims to provide general as well as Country specific guidelines and other resource materials for the benefit of stakeholders. Medical/ Legal / Social Work Professionals, Law Enforcement Authorities and Judiciary of respective countries who deal with cases of child abuse & neglect can benefit from accessing the website. Materials are available to educate teachers, parents and children themselves on preventive aspects. Resource materials on Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect were again updated and uploaded in our site for 26 Asian countries.

### **Initiatives under the mandate of the Government of Tamil Nadu**

#### **Rapid Review on the Impact of COVID-19 on the Lives of Children**

Indian Council for Child Welfare, Tamil Nadu has undertaken a rapid review on "The Impact of COVID-19 Pandemic on the Lives of Children". The rapid review to assess the impact of COVID-19 pandemic was designed to fulfill the following main objectives:

- To assess the impact of COVID-19 pandemic on the lives of children in selected districts of Tamil Nadu and identify children who have lost one or both parents due to COVID-19
- To gain insights on the impact of COVID-19 on Education, Health & Nutrition and Protection of children and to provide evidence-based suggestions for policy level interventions.

The rapid review was conducted in the districts of Chennai, Madurai and Cuddalore. With guidance and support from the Government departments of each of the districts the areas for the survey were selected.

The surveyors, who undertook the survey was trained to question in a casual seeming conversation with parents/relatives.

Multiple discussions were held with the officials of Department of Social Defence, Department of Public health and Preventive Medicine & Greater Chennai Corporation, Doctors from Institute of Child Health & Children's Hospital Egmore and various subject experts before finalizing the methodology. Subject expert group discussions were held before finalizing the questionnaire. For the ease and convenience of the respondents and surveyors the questionnaires were translated into Tamil.

To conduct the rapid review, questionnaires were prepared for two age groups: Birth to 5 years and 6 to 18 years.

The survey in Madurai and Cuddalore was conducted in the month of September- October 2021, and in Chennai during October- November 2021. Each surveyor collected nearly 120 child data.

Data gathering information was regularly monitored by the coordinators. Gathered data from all three districts were digitized.

In the rapid review conducted 3000 data relates to children less than five years and 4981 data relates to six to eighteen years category.

From the data collected and from the field experience we arrived at the following conclusion:

- The online classes though have helped the children to have an exposure to modern technology and to keep themselves in tune with the digital era, inability to own a smartphone by children of lower socio-economic strata has accentuated the inequality in the quality of education. In our field survey majority parents strongly believed in in-person classroom learning. They were worried that virtual learning may hamper children's ability to be competitive in the future. They also expressed that they were worried about connectivity issues, lack of study space at home and lack of peer group assistance and support. The parents were worried that children may get addicted to smartphone and become a prey to cybercrimes. This has also led to lack of physical activity.
- Coming to the question of health of children, closure of schools has led to non-availability of mid-day meal and this has led to under nourishment in the case of rural/lower economic strata households. Off late though dry rations were distributed majority of the parents said that they use this dry ration for the family as such and not exclusively for the child. In the case of children below two years what we observed was many have missed their second or third dosage of vaccination.
- In our field survey about 343 children are likely to discontinue their studies and though the parents/relatives expressed financial problem as the major reason, there is every possibility that this dropout may lead to increase in child labour and child marriage. In many rural areas, children are already engaged in farm work and, in the case of girls' domestic work in view of the limited hours of online classes.

One of the important shortcoming of this rapid review was our inability to contact the children especially the adolescent boys and girls in person to assess the difficulty experienced in access/usage of smartphones, difficulties experienced in attending the classes through online, in not meeting their friends daily and not having extracurricular activities etc., Since all the above have a bearing on the mental health of children, this rapid review indicates the necessity for a detailed study on the impact of the COVID-19 on children's current/future development.

The report preparation and the final editing is underway. The report is to be submitted to the upon completion of the report.

## **CHILD MARRIAGE IN THE COVID ERA**

### **An implementation gap study in the period between March 2020 to November 2021**

(Undertaken as a 5 month study from November 2021 till March 2022)

Child marriage, according to the Indian law, is a marriage where either the woman is below age 18 or the man is below age 21. Most child marriages involve underage women, many of whom are in poor socio-economic conditions & lack of awareness.

An attempt was made to capture the impact of the pandemic on child marriages, and if perceptible, the changes in the scenario from what existed in 2018. This exercise has been undertaken with data from the districts of Chennai city (North), Cuddalore District (East), Madurai District (South), and Dharmapuri District (West) of Tamil Nadu.

We are keeping the study to these four districts in the state so as to be able to cover the four directions of the state.

After the data collection we are putting forth 2 level recommendations to the State Government:

1. Societal &
2. Governmental

The main impactful finding from this exercise has been that the data is not maintained legitimately in any one single MIS system which leads to erroneous and wrong depiction of data. Till such time a clear MIS is formed all reports and reporting authorities will be able to suggest subjective and qualitative reforms etc but no agency will be able to pin point the actual numbers and therefore the objective and quantitative avenues to combat this challenge in the state of Tamil Nadu will not be feasible and the situation will continue.

This study has been completed and is at present in the report writing stage. It will be submit in April 2022.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Center was started in 1993, to fulfill the need for a center for information on children's issues. The Center has a library with a rich collection of books, documents, reports, Government Orders, articles and Newspaper clippings on all matters relating to child welfare.

- To compile, document and disseminate information on all areas of child rights and development in India, particularly Tamil Nadu.
- To initiate and sustain advocacy programmes for promoting Child Rights Awareness
- To offer Training and Capacity Building to Students of Social Work and other Allied Courses

#### **Activities**

- Orientation on the activities of the Council was given to 3 Colleges of Social Work
- Hard copies of Newspaper clippings on various child related issues collected and documented.
- We supervised and monitored 30 students from various city colleges towards their concurrent field work and Block Placement. The IDRC guided the students in applying their theoretical knowledge to practice. We also helped in developing their skills to better their understanding of concepts applicable to their field of Social Work.
- IDRC helped students to fulfill the tasks required for their coursework. Students submitted weekly and annual reports of their work. An evaluation was done for all the students at the end of the fieldwork and marks submitted to their respective colleges.
